WATERLOO FARM AND DEWEY SCHOOL MUSEUM RAISES FUNDS FOR FARMHOUSE ROOF RESTORATION

Fundraising is currently going on for a restoration project at the Waterloo Farm Museum in Grass Lake, MI, according to a May 14th article by Mlive.

The 14-room farmhouse began as a log cabin built in 1844 by the Realy family, who occupied the house until 1960. Since then, the Waterloo Area Historical Society has operated and maintained the farm. It is raising \$40,000 through GoFundMe to replace the 33-year-old wood-shingle farmhouse roof. In the 1890's, it had a metal roof, which is the type that will again be installed when construction work begins this month. Such a roof could last 100 years.

Some additional repairs will be made to the nearby Dewey School Museum where the WAHS conducts a historical program for area students during the summer, as well as farmhouse tours from Memorial Day thru Labor Day. This year, however, due to Covid-19, they are considering remaining closed on weekends; many of the all-volunteer staff are retirees, who wisely fear exposure to the coronavirus.

An event scheduled for late June is now confirmed cancelled. The website says: "Due to the pandemic, the Blacksmith, Soldier and Log Cabin event scheduled for June 27 & 28 is unfortunately cancelled. With the current stay home order extended to June 12th and the limit of gatherings to less than 10 persons, we feel it is not safe to hold this event. Please Stay Safe – Stay Home."

I hope you all are safe. Our distance has only reenforced how very important you all are to me. Can't wait to see you all again very soon and yell at you.

Tributes for Memorial Day

Today in honor of Memorial Day I would like to recognize a World War II veteran who I have never met, yet I had heard many stories about him from my mother. I'm sure my mother would not mind me sharing this story.

I have shared this story for the last couple of years. Someday I hope to share a photo of him. My hope is that someday I will be able to find his family and maybe, just maybe, there will be letters, saved, that were from my mother to him.

My mother met this young army private in New York, just days before he was to be shipped off to Europe. This handsome young Italian man fell head over heels in love with my mother. From what I could gather as she conveyed the stories to me through the years, she was quite smitten with him also. They exchanged letters which my mother hung onto for many years. He had written his own mother telling her that when he returned from the war that he was going to marry my mother. Unfortunately, this was not meant to be; as he was parachuting out of a plane he was killed in action. His body was never found.

Of course my mother went on with her life, and it's a good thing, as she met my father; otherwise, I would not be here to share the story.

As we honored veterans across this great nation of ours today I couldn't help but to think of those soldiers who never got a chance to marry and have children, enhancing the possibility that many years later they would be forgotten.

Today I would like to remember: Private Frank A. Melchionno -- Born 1923 New York; enlisted May 3, 1943.

Thank you, Frankie, for loving my mother. I know she always carried a special place in her heart for you as there would be a twinkle in her eyes as she would convey to me stories of your short time together. And thank you for your service to our country.



By former 7^{TH} MI member, Sandra Smith McCarrick:

My great uncle enlisted for the Civil War in Burlington, Iowa, and moved to Keokuk County, Iowa where the enlistees had to wait for their coats to be made by the ladies of the community after the local doctor donated the fabric. He was moved to St. Louis, Mo. He became ill and was in confinement in the hospital at Jefferson City, Mo. Returned to service and guarded the railroad at Boonville and Syracuse, Mo. with Fremont's Campaign. Was sick in the Hospital in Syracuse. Was moved from there to Mississippi. Fought in the Battle of luka and was wounded in the leg. He was sent to Jefferson Barracks in Jefferson City, Mo., where he recovered. He was returned to duty and sent to Corinth, Miss. He fought in many battles along the way, finally entering the Battle of Champion Hill east of Vicksburg, where he was mortally wounded and died the following day. He was buried there on the battle field in a shallow grave along with his comrades and the Confederates.



When Vicksburg National Cemetery was established, the Union soldiers' remains were removed from the battlefield and

interred there. Many were unknown and are buried in a special section designated for them. My uncle is in that section. He was the oldest of the family, was not married and had no children. If you go online you can find the account by the Iowa 5th Regimental Adjutant Samuel Hawkins Marshall Byers called WITH FIRE AND SWORD. It is very graphic and an eye opening read. They served under Grant so I definitely want to watch the 3 part series about him and the Civil War beginning tonight at 9:00 on the History channel.

My great-grandfather also enlisted and had to have my great-grandfather's permission to join as he was too young. I have a copy of that form with his signature on it. His story was totally different and I may relate that later.

GOD BLESS ALL OF OUR FALLEN WHO HAVE PROTECTED US AND OUR WONDERFUL COUNTRY THROUGH MANY WARS. Note: If you have ancestors who served in any of the wars you can obtain their records from the National Archives. Make sure you ask for both their military and retirement records as they contain different information.

As one of three companies of his neighbors, he marched on 19 April 1775, from North Brookfield, Massachusetts, toward Lexington and Concord. Before 17 September 1776, he was reported among the dead. He left a widow, Abigail, and two sons: eleven year old Nathaniel and four year old Matthew, who would become my 4th great-grandfather. The war would continue to 1783 and result in the birth of the Nation that I love.



This picture is of 2 Michigan Civil War Veterans .

On the left is "Frank Howe" from Emmet Mich, who enlisted at 21 years old in Co. C of the 20th Michigan Infantry. Frank was destined to lose his left leg in the fighting at Petersburg.

On the right is "Velrus Bruce" from Adrian, who enlisted at 19 in Co A of the 17th Michigan Infantry. Velrus would lose his right leg at the small battle of Campbell's Station, Tennessee on November 16th of '63, and would become one of the 400 Union casualties.

This picture was probably sold as a fund raiser, because it was captioned: "United we stand, Divided we fall."



During 2019, just under 1,000 individuals toured Michigan's Grand Army of Republic Memorial Hall and Museum (G.A.R. Museum). Since then the G.A.R. Museum has acquired many new artifacts and records pertaining to the Grand Army of the Republic and in particular to the Grand Army of the Republic in Michigan. We now have just under 5,000 such artifacts and records housed in the G.A.R. Museum, which are available to the public for viewing and research. In addition, last year we hosted five Civil War history seminars during the year. In contrast, since March 15th of this year our programs and traffic have become nonexistent and our revenue has been reduced to almost the same due

to the pandemic. It currently appears that this shut down may continue into the summer months canceling all our annual programs including our history seminars, our sponsorship of the Memorial Day parade and programs in the community in which the G.A.R. Museum is located, potentially our July 4th activities and our annual Civil War Day Camp for children (7 -14-year-olds), and several other special programs at the G.A.R. Museum. Consequently, this year's "Giving Tuesday", has become even more paramount to the sustainability of the G.A.R. Museum.

We fully understand and appreciate the fact that we are not the only nonprofit organization caught up in this mess, however, that appreciation, unfortunately, does not help us to pay our ongoing bills for the upkeep of our artifacts and the original 1886-built G.A.R. Post building in which the G.A.R. Museum is housed. In order to help us get through this and allow us to recover and grow when we are again permitted to do so, we hope that you will consider becoming a sponsor or, if already a sponsor, to renew your sponsorship, and interest in our G.A.R Museum family by becoming a 2020 Sponsor of Michigan's G.A.R.
