

Saturday, March 19 Civilian Sewing Gathering — Home of Vonda Warren










Charley Colegrove Memorial Shoot: April 30




Annual Spring Drill April 8~10, 2022 Sponsored by 12th South Carolina / 4th Michigan Volunteer Infantry, Inc.

Col. Hall / Michigan Monument At Antietam: Progress Report

Michigan Civil War Association: Feb. 11

We are excited to share progress on the Michigan Monument at Antietam project. Artist and sculptor Michael Kraus has completed the clay maquette (a fifteen-inch tall representation of the final sculpture) representing Colonel Norman Hall. As you can see from the clay and the photo of Colonel Hall, Michael did a great job with his features as well as the officer's cap. Of course the finished piece will exhibit even more details.

The maquette is at a foundry for the purpose of casting a bronze, which will aid in awareness, promotion, and fundraising. Several people have asked if bronze maquettes might be available for sale or a donation. We are considering these options as well as potentially creating some with a less expensive resin-type material.

Michael has been exceptional to work with throughout this process! The conversations with him are always productive, inclusive, and exciting. He has been a true partner in the process, both in terms of history and artistry, and we look forward to the other phases of the project with the ultimate goal of a Michigan monument at Antietam.

We are often asked about the time-line. Much of that depends on fundraising efforts. What has been raised to date has allowed us to accomplish the first phase of the maquette and in launching our fund raising efforts. Whether one of our followers would like to make a single donation to cover the rest (in our dreams) or it is campaign of grass-roots efforts by many, we look forward to finish line. Look to hear more on that from us soon!

Included is a rendering of Included is a rendering of approximately what the finished piece will look like as well as specs on the stone base. Please note that the text to be written on the bronze plaques has not yet been finalized but it will be similar to like monuments on battlefields. Also, the inscription on the base with the Michigan seal is yet to be determined but we are leaning toward having MICHIGAN inscribed for immediate recognition.

Norman J. Hall (1837 – 1867) was born in New York State in 1837 and graduated from West Point in 1859. At age 12, he moved with his family to Raisinville in Monroe County, MI As a young officer in the first year of he Civil War, he had already performed a least one feat of battlefield bravery, when in July 1862 he accepted a com-mission as colonel of the 7th Michigan Infantry.

At the Battle of Antietam that September, his regiment suffered 60% casualties, and he himself was wounded. He was cited for gallantry for his actions both in that battle, and later in the Battle of Fredericksburg. Twenty-five year old Hall volunteered to lead the 7th Michigan on the dangerous river crossing while under fierce enemy fire, in order to take the town. That feat was eventually achieved by Michigan I men in open boats, under command of

Lt. Col. Henry Baxter of the 7th Michigan Volunteer Infantry.

Col. Hall served with distinction until late in the War, when his health failed and he returned home, dying two years later. He is buried at West Point.



NOTE: Our club donated \$500 to the monument project when it was initially suggested in 2015.





Quartermaster's Report

Our cap supply consists of Schuetzen, RWS, and CCI 4 wing musket caps, and RWS pistol caps. Schuetzen musket

caps come in sleeves of 100 and the cost for them is \$9 per tin, CCI 4 wing musket caps at \$9 per tinof 100, and RWS musket caps in tins of 200 and the cost for them is \$19 per tin. We also have some no 1075 (no 11) RWS pistol caps. RWS no 1075 caps come 250 to a tin and cost \$20 per tin. RWS no1075 pistol caps (no 11) are slightly smaller than CCI or Remington no11 caps. Price for Schuetzen powder will be \$21 per pound.

NOTICE FOR THOSE USING SCHUETZEN CAPS you will need to save a RWS or CCI tin as Schuetzen caps are packed 100 in flat sleeves like reloading primers.

Late News: The FTC has objected to the merger of Sportsman's Warehouse between Bass Pro Shops/Cabela's! Apparently the FTC thought that if the merger were to go forward Bass Pro Shops/Cabela's would have an unfair advantage, not a monopoly and Sportsman's Warehouse has withdrawn from the merger. Only time will tell if Sportsman's Warehouse can survive.

The Civil War Bookshelf





 \bigcirc few years ago, Ellyn graciously requested Club members to submit book reviews for the newsletter. This is my first attempt to do so, so bear with me.

Stanton: The Life and Times of Lincoln's Secretary of War Author: Benjamin P. Thomas, Harold M. Hyman -Published 1962, Alfred A. Knoph, Inc. - 643 Pages

This is an excellent book covering the private and public life of, what I now consider, one of the primary architects of the Union victory in the Civil War. Everything I had read previously about Mr. Stanton led me to believe he was a cutthroat lawyer who inflicted his will on everything he touched with no concern for how it affected anyone. I could not have been more wrong. This book uses primary source material and personal correspondence to reveal the real man and his herculean

efforts during the war. To paraphrase a statement by the author, Edwin Stanton should be considered on the same level as Lincoln, Grant, and Sherman for winning the war that preserved the Union. ---Tom Emerick
