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

Doug McComas has submitted a report on our men who participated in the August 13-14 Antietam NPS Living History Program in Antietam, MD.

Last weekend was the 35th Annual Jackson Civil War Muster. Wow!!! From my point of view the event was a great success. The return to the original Cascades Falls site, the beautiful weather, and how the new host organization ran the whole show seemed beyond reproach. We kept bumping into past Club members with more than a few seeking to return to the fold.

Joan and I had a grand view of the Saturday battle from the top of the hill filled to capacity with spectators. Dave Downing did his usual excellent narration of the activities (battle, cavalry demonstrations, etc.) down on the battlefield both days.

Don Everett set up his barbershop impression and Julie and Vonda manned a civilian tent next door. Both were in the high traffic path to and from the battlefield and band shell and they experienced lots of questions and interaction with spectators. The Camp Chase Fifes & Drums put on some excellent musical demonstrations both days.

We had a chance to wander about the authentic Civilian camp both days and dropped in to visit the Malick, Hershey, and Mai households along with many of the "old-timers" we are friends with. Be sure to put this on your calendar for next year.

Now comes the part for me to brag a little bit about the Military...

At Charlton Park, I proposed to Colonel Nick Miner (US) that the Union army perform an unscheduled Dress Parade ceremony on the battlefield in front of the spectators on Saturday before the battle. The Union Army at Jackson has never done Dress Parade in front of a public audience and we thought this would be fun for the troops and educational for the crowd at the same time. Upon hearing of my proposal, TJ Berlucchi volunteered to follow-up with the Camp Chase Fifes and Drums to determine their interest in participating. On Saturday morning, Camp Chase Fifes and Drums committed to leading the Union troops onto the battlefield and serve as the Field Music for Dress Parade. When Colonel Nick Medich (CSA) heard of our plans, he requested that the Confederate battalion be included in a combined Union and Confederate Dress Parade. To say the least, I was ecstatic to lead the ceremony as Adjutant. And the spectators were treated to a portrayal of a period-correct military Dress Parade, I suspect, for the first time ever. I was thrilled to assist with this and will be indebted to both the Colonels, the US and CSA armies, and Camp Chase Fifes and Drums for portraying this special ceremony for the spectators. Huzzah!

After Action Report: 2022 Civil War Discovery Camp Tues., August 9, 2022

Michigan's G.A.R. Memorial Hall & Museum's 2022 Civil War Camp on Eaton Rapids' G.A.R. Island Park was a



rousing success. Thirty kids, ages 7 – 14 participated. This was the most participation that we have had since 2015 when the G.A.R. Museum began the annual August Civil War Camp program.

During the program, considerable time was spent teaching the kids, the manual of arms with their wood muskets, how to left and right face, and how to march. What is absolutely amazing was the speed in which the kids - even the youngest - picked up on all this. Teaching kids is nothing like teaching adults. The kids are like sponges who soak up everything in a very short time while the adults are like impermeable rocks with everything washing off, but I digress. The kids also were allowed to fire a real musket (the kids wearing safety glasses, having ear plugs and just being allowed to pull the trigger). The kids were then broken up and allowed to visit several learning stations where they became familiar with the clothing and equipment used by the soldiers, the medical practices of the time, etc. Lunch was provided with the fare being Subway sandwiches, chips, and bottled water. After lunch more informational programs were provided, including a segment about the Grand Army of the Republic and the Woman's Relief Corp at the monument on G.A.R. Island Park. Following this, the kids were split up into two groups, assigned either Union or Confederate status, and the battle of Antietam's Burnside's Bridge was reenacted – with many fictional maneuvers offered up by the combatants. However, it all ended historically correct. After all this, the kids were marched back to the G.A.R. museum where they deposited their wooden muskets, were told more about G.A.R. Museum and what many veterans did after the Civil War, and then were discharged from federal service, paid off with authentic 1861 fake money, and provided some additional historical booklets as souvenirs of the camp. An undertaking like this cannot be done without the assistance of several volunteers. Military: After-Action Report- NPS Living History Program, Antietam, MD August 13-14, 2022

Friday morning three lads from the 7th left Michigan for a grand adventure, joining our pards from the 12th SC/4th MI in representing the 7th Michigan Company C near the West Woods. A smooth trip had us arriving about 4 pm to a beautiful, sunny sky where we set up our dog tents for the weekend, checked in, and did some preliminary drill.

Saturday was another picture perfect weather day. After a hearty breakfast of bacon, biscuits, and gravy the lads drilled, and provided three presentations to the public. We were pleased and surprised to have our own David Dzierbicki make an appearance. Dave was recovering from an accident at the

plant and was unable to fall in, but spectated and cheered on the boys. The demonstrations were led by Captain Brian Crater, with able narration from Ben Cwayna. We loaded in 9 times (your captain found his private skills had definitely eroded after 5 years waiving a sword, but were still passable). We were asked by the park, on the third demonstration, to be filmed loading in 9 times for the new interpretive video being created for the visitors' center. The cool thing is, that means our own Steve Church, who was in the previous video, is also in the front rank of the upcoming video. We spent the evening spectating the West Woods, Bloody Lane, and Burnside's Bridge.

Another beautiful morning dawned, and we entered what, for me, was truly the main event. I was given the great honor of placing a wreath for the 7th Michigan at the corner of the West Woods with my old friend Dan Hall. I am not ashamed to tell you that I felt great emotion as we contemplated the 400-plus men who went into the woods, losing over 200 in less than 20 minutes. I took the liberty of leaving a Celtic cross on the wreath, and we affixed a Michigan button to a concrete fence post at the site, in memory of the boys. Then followed two demonstrations. On our final trip to camp, Steve Church was handed the regimental banner to carry back to the Dunkard Church, and she was a beautiful sight waving in a stiff breeze.

We packed up and headed over to West Virginia to take in Harper's Ferry. Arriving in a light rain, we jumped on the bus, and found David Dzierbicki seated next to us. The four of us had a great time taking in the sights and having a great dinner and drinks at "The Rabbit Hole". They were wonderful, even if they had no flights. LOL. A safe journey ended with a quick side trip in Tipton, Michigan, to view the earliest public subscription Civil War monument in the state, that was placed in 1866. It was truly a magical experience I shall never forget. And this is for you, Brian Crater: It was . . . F ing Amazing!!!!!!

Quartermaster's Report



Our cap supply consists of Schuetzen, RWS, and CCI 4 wing musket caps, and RWS pistol caps. Schuetzen musket caps come in sleeves of 100 and the cost for them is \$9 per 100, CCI 4 wing

musket caps at \$9 per 100, and RWS musket caps in tins of 200 and the cost for them is \$19 per tin. We also have some no 1075 (no 11) RWS pistol caps. RWS no 1075 caps come 250 to a tin and cost \$20 per tin. RWS no1075 pistol caps (no 11) are slightly smaller than CCI or Remington no11 caps. Price for Schuetzen powder is \$21 per pound.

NOTICE FOR THOSE USING SCHUETZEN CAPS: You will need to save a RWS or CCI tin as Schuetzen caps are packed 100 in flat sleeves like reloading primers.



7th Michigan Monument in Fredericksburg 20th Anniversary

The monument to the 7th Michigan's crossing of the Rappahannock River in Fredericksburg, VA. in December of 1862 will be 20 years old next summer. The club started exploring, then working on creating, the monument in 2001. The US Park Service requested we use a boulder from Michigan, so our first step was to locate a suitable boulder to use. Once the boulder was found, we worked with the Marsh Monument Company in Durand to create the monument. A suitable scene for the bronze plaque to be affixed to the boulder was drawn by Brian Kirschensteiner and edited by Bob Smith. The picture below shows a club gathering in March of 2003 at the new monument behind the Marsh Monument company. Two pictures below show a gathering of a group of military and civilians at the monument dedication ceremony on August 31, 2003, in Fredericksburg. The remaining pictures are of the monument in place in Fredericksburg at the original 7th Michigan crossing site. More photos of the monument preparation and ceremony will be available for viewing at future club meetings.

We are in the planning phase now to celebrate the 20^{th} anniversary of the monument dedication by holding a celebration at the monument next summer in Fredericksburg. The planning team currently consists of Dave Downing, Bob Smith and Jim Kirschensteiner, and any club member interested in helping with this is more than welcome. We are tentatively looking at Sunday, June 25^{th} as a possible day to hold this event in Fredericksburg. This date is prior to the 160th anniversary of the battle at Gettysburg the following weekend. We would like to have as many members participate in this celebration as possible.

A "Gettysburg" Tribute By Director Ron Maxwell

Thirty years ago this summer we filmed the movie Gettysburg. Anyone associated with the motion-picture industry knows just how hard it is to get any movie made. To oversimplify, there are basically two kinds of movies: the ones churned out on an assembly line, glossy and formulaic; and those willed into being by a solitary filmmaker - so called 'auteur' films. Obviously, both kinds can result in memorable movies as well as duds.

Thanks to Ted Turner, Gettysburg was made as an independent, auteur film. Translation - there was no interference in the content, storytelling, editing or final cut. Input? Yes. Participation? Yes. But no interference, censuring, bullying, threats, intimidation or pressure - other than staying on schedule and on budget.

This film, whatever you may think of it, would not exist without the financial commitment and total creative support of Ted Turner.


On this 30th anniversary of its filming, it would be derelict of me not to acknowledge the other major factor that made this movie what it is, namely the reenactors. When you see the thirty minutes of the Pickett's Charge sequence, recall there's no CGI. There

are actually 5,000 troops in those scenes. That permitted us to place cameras wherever we wanted. Everywhere we filmed what we saw were authentic civil war soldiers, up close and personal. It's one of the factors that makes the film as authentic and believable as it is.


This is not to claim we made the perfect film. If anyone is aware of its shortcomings, it's me. But none of these failings, however large or small, detracts from the life of this movie and it's continued discovery by audiences here at home and across the globe. I see the quarterly reports from the studio. Gettysburg is being watched by more people today than even the number of those who viewed it over the past thirty years. Such is the power and reach of streaming TV.


