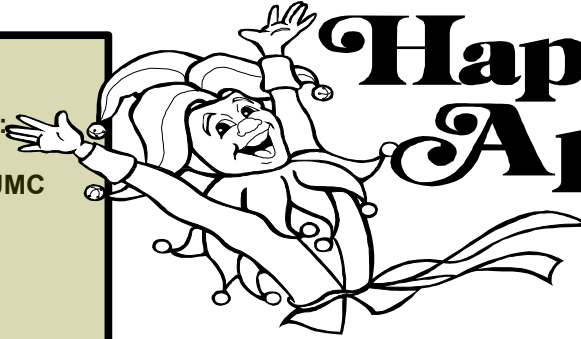
Thanks to all who submitted info for this month's issue.

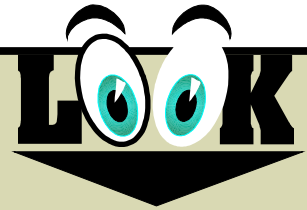

Some Additional Words from the Editor.....

Beginning next issue, I would like to begin attempting to reduce the (digital) file size of the newsletter by limiting the number of maps we include, so as to expedite the electronic mailing process. I'm in the process of building a digital map file for most of the places our members go, as well as the homes of members who host meetings or get togethers.

Part of my thinking on this matter relates to the fact that I envision us including, from time to time, more photos of special personal or family occasions, or of unit events—in particular, a funny, awesome, poignant, or otherwise unique reenacting moment caught on film (such as the feature on Co. F, last issue).

I very much need to hear your feedback on this—either yay or nay, as regards the map idea—or a different option you might propose-- as well as your thoughts on whether to include more photos. This plan of mine is by no means set in stone—if everyone tells me they hate the idea, we won't do it. Democracy rules! SO I do hope to hear from you.

2012 Military Activities

March 10 – Company and Battalion Drill School of Instruction – Leslie, MI

Tom Emerick reported approximately 35 men from various units participated. Representatives from the 3rd Michigan, 7th Michigan, 17th Michigan, 18th Michigan, 21st Michigan, and 5th Texas (CS) fell in for a full day of drill. The Dave Baumann of the 3rd Michigan (this is getting monotonous) was the winner of the free lunch. A good time was had by all and we are looking forward with great anticipation to the upcoming season.

March 30 - April 1 – 150th Anniversary Battle of Shiloh/Armies of Tennessee - Counce, TN

Tom reported the event was almost upon us. Approximately 18 men of the 7th Michigan are traveling south for the event. Look to the next newsletter for an after-action report.

April 21, 2011 – 7th Michigan Tassel Top Mess/Military Live Shoot – Eaton Rapids, MI

May 27 – Monroe Civil War Monument Dedication – Monroe, MI

This will be a dedication ceremony for a monument honoring over 400 Monroe County soldiers who died during the Civil War. We should plan to arrive about 10:00 to ensure we have a close parking spot. The actual ceremony commences at 2:00 P.M. and is being held at the Soldiers and Sailors Park located at the corner of East Front and Navarre Streets in Monroe, Michigan. There will be a Civil War Living History encampment onsite next to the Sawyer House located at 320 East Front Street, Monroe, MI 48161 from Noon to 4:00 P.M. for those who want to pitch tents and/or drill. Confirmed participants to date include 7th Michigan Infantry, Co. B, 15th Michigan Infantry, Co. B, an artillery battery representing the 1st Michigan Light Artillery Battery H "DeGoylers, 5th Michigan Regimental Band, Fred Priebe portraying President Abraham Lincoln, and Steve Alexander portraying General George Custer. The 7th Michigan is committed to supporting the Greenfield Village Memorial weekend event. We have received permission from the hosts and Union headquarters to leave the Village grounds to participate in the Monroe ceremony. We will be organizing carpools to the event from the Village as the date comes closer. All Civil War re-enactors are invited to attend. For information call (734) 847-9527. October 6-7 – 150th Anniversary Battle of Perryville - Perryville, KY

Tom Emerick initiated a discussion regarding the three Club maximum-effort events (Antietam NPS, Holland, and Perryville) scheduled within a four week period in September and October. The Military is concerned about reduced Club participation at all three events given the condensed time period. The Military discussion revealed strong support for retaining the Antietam and Holland events on our schedule. The Military voted to recommend to the Club maintaining the Antietam and Holland events as Club maximum-effort events along with replacing the Perryville, KY event with Fredericksburg, VA (see below) as the final event of the year. The recommendation was subsequently discussed, voted on, and approved by the Club membership at the General Business meeting.

December 7-9 – 150th Anniversary Battle of Fredericksburg – Fredericksburg, VA

Tom Emerick reported our good friend Scot Buffington of the U.S. Volunteers has extended a personal invitation to the 7th Michigan to participate in this late year event. For Club members new to the hobby, the original 7th Michigan spearheaded an amphibious assault across the Rappahannock during the 1862 Battle of Fredericksburg. In 2003 the Club raised funds, had built, and dedicated a monument to the 7th Michigan on the banks of the Rappahannock in downtown Fredericksburg where the original landing took place. In 2010 we raised funds, had built, and dedicated a bronze plaque at the Union Church where the 7th Michigan was encamped during the Fredericksburg campaign. The "Fire on the Rappahannock" event will be held on portions of the actual battlefield and will include a recreation of the street battles in downtown Fredericksburg, a crossing of the Rappahannock on a modern pontoon bridge and in reproduction pontoon boats, and an attack on Marye's Heights. The 7th Michigan will be reliving the conflict where we earned our battle honors as the "Forlorn Hope". Registration is \$15/person before November 15th and \$25 person after that date. The 7th Michigan deeply appreciates all of the support received from our brethren Cumberland Guard units and non-Guard brothers-in-arms during our trials and tribulations with the Cumberland Guard leadership over the past half year. The 7th Michigan is truly blessed for all of the friends we have made over these past thirty years. We are anxiously looking forward to sharing camaraderie with all of our friends in the upcoming season and the opportunity to truly honor those who made the greatest sacrifice in the war to preserve the Union.

The date for the live shoot is April 21st.

Also for those of you that have .31 cal., .36 cal., & .44 cal. percussion pistols there will be a supply of cast balls so that you may fire your pistols. Bring powder & caps. There will be a supply of FFFg powder and musket caps available to purchase at the shoot as well as cartridge paper for rolling blanks for the upcoming season.

For those new, or fairly new civilian members to the unit, or "old hands" needing to refresh skills, excellent workshops and seminars for the creating of necessary clothing and accessories are available through The Dressmaker's Shop, in Leslie, MI. Listed below are the opportunities featured for the remainder of the spring session. Sign up in advance is required.

***Cage Crinoline** by Kimberly Lynch Level: Beginner April 14th, Saturday, 9am-5pm. Cost: \$40, includes lunch. Kits available for \$60/each. Additional kits will be available at the class. (Be sure to let Kimberly know.) Bring your sewing machine, white thread, needle-nose pliers, rivet gun (if you have one, otherwise we will share).

***Men's / Boys' Trousers** by Kimberly Lynch Level: High Beginner. **April 15th, Sunday 9am-5pm** Cost: \$40, materials and pattern extra. Learn to make period appropriate button-fly trousers. You will need pattern, fabric, matching thread, buttons, sewing machine, scissors, pins, needles, measuring tape, etc. The patterns we will be using are Past Pattern #014 or #015 for men, Period Impressions pattern #202 for boys.

1860's Spoon Bonnet Form by Kimberly Lynch Level: High Beginner. **April 21, Saturday 9am-5pm.** Cost: \$40, includes, pattern, parchment paper and wire. Braiding and matching thread is extra. Learn to make an 1860's low spoon bonnet form made of hemp straw braiding. You will need to bring a sewing machine, thread to match, pins, scissors, hand needles, sewing gauge, measuring tape, etc.

***Man's 1850-1860's Vest** by Kimberly Lynch **Sunday, April 22, 9am-5pm.** Cost: \$40.00, includes kid leather facing. Level: Intermediate. Learn to make a man's vest from the 1850-1860's. This item of dress was essential for men of almost every social class. We will be working with Past Patterns pattern #018. You will need to bring a sewing machine, fabric, thread, pins, scissors, hand needles, measuring tape, sewing gauge, etc. Supplies can be purchased at The Dressmaker's Shop and other fine stores.

Decorating Bonnets by Kimberly Lynch **Saturday, April 28, 10am-4pm.** Cost: \$35, materials extra. Level: Beginner. Learn to decorate a bonnet in the latest fashion of the late 1850- early 1860's. You will need to bring either a silk drawn bonnet- completed or a straw bonnet form - finished. You will also need a variety of trims such as silk or paper flowers, cotton lace, silk ribbon. Antique ribbon and lace work very nicely. 1 1/2- 2 yards of wide (2 1/2" - 3") ribbon for bonnet ties. If you are working with a straw bonnet, you will need 1/3- 1/2 yd of silk for the curtain. General sewing supplies such as hand needles, thread, pins, scissors, wire cutters or needle-nose pliers.

Be sure to note that the shop has been relocated to our home. We welcome visitors to the new location, but by appointment ONLY. We no longer have regular store hours.
