March Membership Meeting Highlights:

Greenfield Village Registration: FINAL DAY is APRIL 15.

Please see the new information from Dave Downing on a later page, and note also the two additional document attachments pertaining to GFV in the email including this issue of the newsletter. Both are important! We are also printing again the information that was included in the March issue, just to make sure everyone has seen it. Remember – there will be NO MODERN CAMPING available this year, and the location for registration has moved. Also, we will only be able to register at GFV on Friday, and Saturday morning, so if you plan on attending for only part of the weekend, you will need to make other arrangements to register, OR attend on Saturday.

Michigan Service Buttons: The club will be purchasing a supply of the uniform buttons that we gave out to participants at the Return of the Flags event last July. Gloria Kirschensteiner reports that it is the <u>small</u> size that are correct for both sack coats and frock coats. (It was the large size that we used on the ribbon rosettes at the Flag event). Sack coats require 4 buttons, and frocks 11 – 9 down the front and two in back. The cost per button is \$1.25 on the website, if anyone wants to buy them direct; however, we will probably be able to get a better price by purchasing in quantity. President Downing will take the proposal with the Executive Board, for a decision on how many gross will be purchased. (Probably two or three gross). Men (or ladies!) wishing to purchase buttons would be wise to buy a couple extra in the event of lost buttons. More info to follow. Ella Sharp Museum Possible Event: Despite the fact that we initially learned that the Ella Sharp event we participated in last May in Jackson is not scheduled to be held this coming year due to a failure by The Ella to receive a renewal of last year's school grant, they have shown a willingness to discuss with the 7th Michigan the possibility of putting on a living history Civil War event with our participation. Our leadership and other members present at the March meeting agreed that we want to pursue this. President Dave Downing stated: "The grant money is more about their funding than ours. We've never let not getting paid to do something like this stand in our way. It's great community engagement, an awesome recruiting opportunity, and fits into our mission statement. ... Creating a partnership with them shouldn't go on the back burner and let another year pass."



We had to apply to even be considered to attend. We should not take being invited to



participate there lightly...besides, we get paid as an organization based on our members showing up.

One of the items brought up at the last meeting was to purchase smaller versions of the buttons used last summer at the flag ceremony at the Capitol so people could put them on their uniforms. We are in the process of ordering some and hope to have them in time so we can be wearing Michigan buttons when this season begins.

The Modern Camping Alternative for Memorial Day Weekend

Many of us were surprised by the fact that this year, for the first time, there will be no Modern Camping available for participants in the Greenfield Village Civil War Muster. Since a show of hands at the recent club meeting indicated that a good number of members would not be attending Greenfield Village since they wouldn't have anywhere to stay, we thought it a good idea to offer an alternative event for the Memorial Day weekend that did have Modern Camping available.

The town of Coldwater, MI and the 18th Michigan are putting on their annual Civil War Days on May 26, 27 and 28. That's a Friday, Saturday and Sunday event with set up starting Thursday night and departure on Sunday afternoon. They don't have activities on Monday, Memorial Day. I was able to get some basic information by phone and they are sending me additional details and a unit registration packet that I will share at the Live Shoot Club Meeting. (Their webpage is currently inoperative.)

The few bits of information I already have are:

- Friday is "Education Day" and the camps entertain 800 to 1000 local school students
- Steam train rides are available (but at a cost for all but U.S. Military Veterans) on Friday and Saturday
- There is a pot luck meal on Saturday night
- There is a Ball, outdoors in a park following the meal
- A Church service is provided on Sunday morning at 10
- Modern Camp is on a parking lot with modern bathrooms and port-a-jons, plus water nearby.
- There are also Authentic Civilian and Military Camps

If you are interested in this event, come to the Live Shoot Meeting in April and learn more. I'll be sending in a unit registration around May 1st for all those who plan to attend.

On Target at the Live Shoot

For several years I've wanted to try something at the live shoot and am hoping to get some volunteers to help try this out. It would be to try our own version of a test to qualify as a sharpshooter. Back during the war a person had to hit ten out of ten in a circle 50-inches in diameter at a distance of 200 yards to qualify. This year I thought we could try out our own version and if it works make a more concerted effort next year.

Here's how it would go:

*a target with a circle 50-inches in diameter placed at 100 yards

*use any period civil war firearm, any ammunition (no artillery...) Weapons with period scopes are allowed.

*place 3 out of 5 shots within the 50-inch circle (any shot even touching the circle will count as a hit)

*those that hit 3 out of 5 will receive a ribbon, or other designation as a qualified sharpshooter

If there is anyone that wants to try this out I'll have the targets at the live shoot and will supervise the shooting. Maybe if the 3 out of 5 seems to be too easy we'll 'raise the bar' some for next year. If you think you might be interested please let me know so I can make sure there are enough targets on site.



Greenfield Village FINAL Info: REGISTRATION DEADLINE IS APRIL 15!

Here are a couple of useful items for you for Greenfield Village. (PLEASE SEE ATTACHMENTS) First is a map giving directions on how to get there, but more important it shows where the new location is for registration. If you look, the CW Check-in is west of the museum, over by the Automotive Hall of Fame. You can park in the lot over there and register at the tent. The easiest way to get there is off of Oakwood Blvd.

Also there is a document which is a tutorial for you to refer to if you need to change your registration to add guests. This is only after you have registered yourself and if you need to modify your guest list. Remember that they only are interested in having people registered who are going to participate at the event. Each person registering will be able to obtain up to 3 guest buttons as in years past.

You should read the instructions very carefully because a couple of things have changed this year. Most important is that the hours for registration have changed. There no longer will be registration on Sunday. If you are planning on coming on Sunday you will need to make arrangements ahead of time for someone to pick up your materials for you and then get with them when you arrive.

Attached are what you will find on the web site so you can have a copy yourself without having to go through saving it on your computer from the internet site.

Please register as soon as possible. The cutoff date is April 15. You have plenty of time if you do it right away. Greenfield Village has our current roster. Once you register online your name will be checked against the roster and you will be approved.

All participants in the 2017 Civil War Remembrance program <u>must</u> check-in in at the Check-In tent prior to entering the Greenfield Village, Eagle Tavern Gate or Blue Gate. **Walk-up Registration and check-ins will not be allowed.**

*Sutlers and Exhibitors should pick up their Check-In Packets at Town Hall (Sutlers) and Village Pavilion (Exhibitors).

Check-In will be held in a new location for 2017 - directions and a map will be sent before the event. All participant must show credentials (button) to enter Security Gates. All participants will enter Greenfield Village via the Eagle Gate following Eagle Lane. It is recommended that Participants bring a copy of their confirmation.

Check-In Hours: Friday, May 26, 2017 5:30 p.m. – 8:30 p.m.



Book Review: Enemy Women

When eighteen-year-old Adair Colley's family home is set afire, and her aging father taken prisoner by a band of ostensibly Union soldiers who are in fact, probably merely bandits, she and her younger sisters become refugees, until--despite the Colley family's avowed neutrality--a fellow traveler's spite results in Adair's arrest for "enemy collaboration." This is an equivocal term in the Missouri of the Civil War years, for this border state--especially in the Ozark back country area of southeastern Missouri where Adair's family farm is located-- is torn by lawlessness and treachery and its citizens are as likely to become victims of their nearest neighbors as of the two legitimate armies, neither of which are really in charge. After being held in a women's prison in St. Louis, Adair hides from roving guerrilla militias on both sides of the war, who will steal her meager possessions, or quite possibly her virtue or her life, as she attempts to make her way back home.

This well-written novel possesses an almost literary quality and is unique in that it takes place in a locale about which we do not generally think much when considering the effects of the Civil War. No vast armies faced off in battlelines across its farmlands and woods; its towns were not reduced to rubble by shelling, nor its streets and fields littered with hundreds of corpses festering under a hot summer sun. Yet the war in MIssouri took a heavy toll. This book tells some of that story. The author, Paulette Jiles, was born and raised in the Missouri Ozarks, so is able to capture the nuances and particular voice of this region. In short, my only complaint against the novel is the rather inexplicable book jacket photo on the hardback version of the book (the one I read) that shows the shadowy figure of a girl running through a woods wearing a flared-style knee length skirt that looks much more like the 1960's than 1860's. Very odd choice!

A companion book that I found intriguing, and which Ms. Jiles cited as one of her research sources is Inside War: The Guerrilla Conflict in Missouri During the American Civil War by Michael Fellman. Missouri was a slave state that rejected secession, thus it was a different kind of war that was fought in Missouri, where conflicting values and views of which side of the war was God's side often resided in the same individual. Anti-slavery back country folk, for instance, carried resentment not only for slave-holding Southerners, but against smug Northerners who insulted them in the newspapers as ignorant, backward "Pukes." In Fellman's words, the war here "truly was a spontaneous creation of the people, by the people, and against the people." Later in the book, he referred to the "blurring of combatants," which also aptly describes the difficulty the Union army had in distinguishing not only who was on which side, but between civilians and soldiers, leading them to begin engaging in guerrilla-style "hit-and-run" warfare, like the enemy, a practice which alienated many Unionist civilians, but was applauded by others. Very fascinating book.
