Re: Annual Fall Weekend Retreat at Mill Run Lodge: Sept. 28-30

The Club has paid for the week-end for members. Katie has decided to cook for us the whole week-end. Breakfast Sat & Sun, Lunch and dinner on Saturday - leftovers for Sunday lunch. She hasn't finalized the menu yet but it will be in the September newsletter and we will need to know then if you are attending. There will be a small charge for the meals.

Just for a refresher or information for the new ones, you can arrive any time after 4:00 pm on Friday and we have the camp till 4:00 pm on Sunday. If you can only come out for Saturday - that's fine, too; come and join us; we have a good time.

The lodge has a fridge, stove, microwave, pots and pans, dishes, two bathrooms - no shower. There are tables we set up for eating, sewing etc. The upstairs is for sleeping and now has bunk beds with a mattress on them but you will need to bring sleeping bag/sheets/blankets etc. For some of the new ones you can bring anything to work on, such as sewing, knitting, scrapbooking, or just can and sit, talk and watch movies.

Katie will have a large selection of chick flicks, if there is something you want to see and you don't have it just ask Katie; she may have. If you have something you would like to bring that's fine; we try to keep to PG/PG-13 movies (DVD only) and no sad endings.

There are some trails you can walk and if you forget anything there is an old county store down the road. There are some rules: no smoking, no pets and no alcohol (if you are discreet you can bring beer, wine, wine coolers etc.) this is because we have had to call the ranger to fix the water heater. We will need to pack up about 1 hour or so before leaving to clean - we have to sweep, clean the bathrooms, mop if necessary, and remove everything from the Fridge.

You will need to bring whatever you want to drink for the week-end and snacks (to share). You are on your own for Friday night dinner - you can eat before you come or bring your dinner out with you or cook something there.

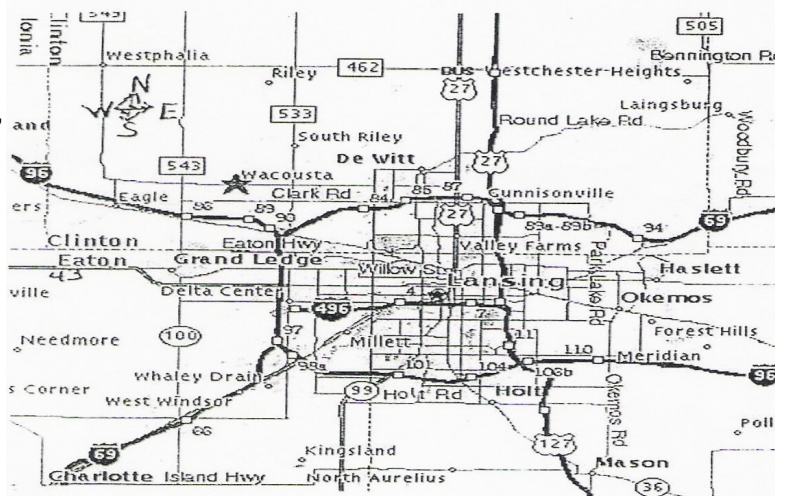

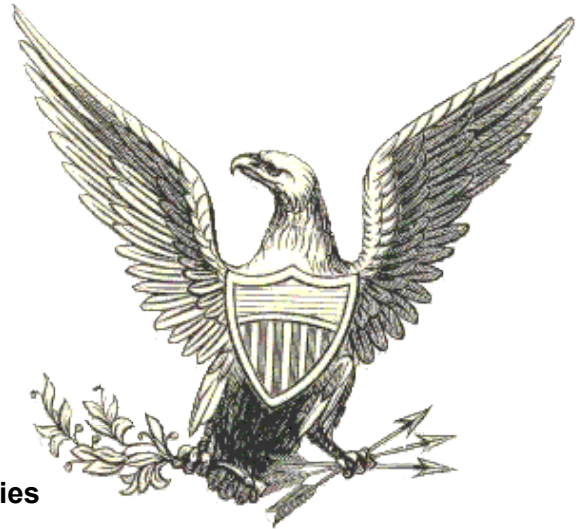

2012 Military Activities

July 21-22 – 150th Historic Charlton Park Civil War Muster - Hastings, MI

Well, what can I say but the temperature at the event was hot just like the rest of Michigan's summer. This year both Union battalions bivouacked outside of the woods by the river which everyone appreciated. During the one hour tactical our company had three Confederate companies to contend with. We made a good show of it but had to hoof it all over the place in order to avoid capture most of the time. Our 2nd Battalion served under the able leadership of Colonel DeCrane and Adjutant Matt Nikkari throughout the weekend. Don Everett portrayed the town barber all weekend long and even went so far as to shoot some Yankee officers passing by during a scenario. Anson and Lorrie Roland and Brittany and Heather Jarrett cooked up an excellent Saturday breakfast and supper, and Sunday dinner. My compliments to the cooks! Many of the 7th Michigan boys "volunteered" to portray dead and wounded soldiers as part of the 3rd Michigan's hospital scenario during the candlelight tours. 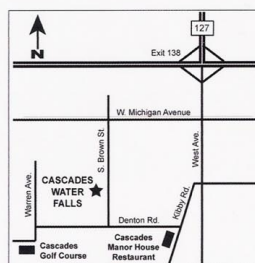

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL:

ROUTE CHANGE TO JACKSON MUSTER

Due to a road construction project this summer on West Avenue in Jackson (a new railroad bridge) an alternate route to the Cascades Park at the south end of town will need to be used by those coming to the Muster from north of town. The section of West Ave. that is closed extends from the North St. intersection to Wildwood Ave. The most direct route from US 127 or I-94 to bypass this section is as follows: At the 127/I-94 interchange (Exit 138), take West Ave. south into town to the North St. light; turn right (west) onto North St. At the next light, turn left (south) onto Wisner. Go south on Wisner to Wildwood. Turn left at the light. Next intersection is West Ave. Turn right to get back onto West Ave. and continue south to the park.
