


#### NO 2018 Wolcott Mill

#### From GAR Memorial Hall and Museum:

## 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Civil War Discovery Camp Wednesday, August 15

Michigan's Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.) Memorial Hall and Museum in Eaton Rapids, Michigan will be holding its fourth annual Civil War Discovery Camp on Wednesday, August 15, 2018 for students 8-years to 14-years old. The students will be arriving at G.A.R. Island Park (Hamlin Street) in Eaton Rapids at 10 AM, where they will spend several hours of planned activities, including learning the Civil War manual of arms with wooden muskets, how to march, how the Civil War soldier lived, and much more. The students will be told about the park and its association with the G.A.R., the Museum, and the Civil War Veterans. They then will be split into groups and provided information about the life of a Civil War soldier and each allowed to fire a reproduction Civil War musket (with prior parental approval). All musket handling will be under strict adult supervision. Adults will load (with powder only), cap, and hold the musket. Students will only be allowed to pull the trigger. All students that fire a musket will be wearing safety glasses. Lunch will be provided to the students while on the island. Around 2 PM, the students will be marched back to the G.A.R. Museum for a tour and to learn about what the G.A.R. Civil War veterans and their auxiliary, the Woman's Relief Corps, did after the war. Following the tour, each camper will be paid \$13 in replica 1860s Civil War federal money and then discharged from "military service".

Support for this event this year graciously comes from the city of Eaton Rapids, Meijers, the Jackson Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) Austin Blair Camp No. 7, Kalamazoo SUVCW General Benjamin Pritchard Camp No 20, and Lansing/Sunfield SUVCW Curtenius Guard Camp No. 17.

# Jackson Muster Update

As everyone is aware, this will be a transition year to conduct the Muster at Ella Sharp Park. I am on the Muster committee and have been attending several recent meetings including walks at Ella Sharp Park to verify the event's logistics.

The first day of registration and setup of the event will begin at 7 am on Friday, August 24th until 11 pm. Registration will begin again on Saturday morning, I assume at 7 am. Saturday's battle will be a reenactment of the Hornets' Nest that occurred at Shiloh. Sunday's battle reenactment will be the Peach Orchard that occurred at Gettysburg.

We are working with the Ella Sharp Park Museum to determine which historic facilities will be open to the public for civilian and military history education. The Park Planetarium will be open and conducting presentations. We are in the process of finalizing a map for the overall layout of the event, which will encompass the majority of the Ella Sharp Park grounds.

An unusual event will be happening Saturday at Ella Sharp Park that is not a part of the reenactment. A wedding had previously been scheduled prior to the decision to move the Muster onto the park grounds. This will occur around 2 pm on Saturday, which is when the reenactment battle will occur. Going forward, no events will be scheduled by Ella Sharp Park on the weekend of Jackson Civil War Muster that are not directly related to the Muster.

New activities being pursued for this year's agenda include a reenactment march from downtown Jackson to Ella Sharp Park on Friday, August 24th to help promote interest in this event. There will not be a special event for school children this year but it will remain on the agenda going forward to involve them more in future Muster events. The Civil War Ball is still on the agenda as well as multiple speakers, including Abraham Lincoln. There will be bleacher options for spectators to observe the reenactment battles. A special handicap parking area will be set up next to the battlefield and commuting vehicles will be available to transport persons from all designated parking lots.

This will be a great transition year. It may not be perfect, but plans are already being discussed for next year's 35th Anniversary event of the Jackson Civil War Muster. Working with Ella Sharp Park staff has been inspirational for continuing to improve and grow this event each year going forward. There are individuals on the committee who are aware of the Civil War event and involvement of school children that our 7th Michigan Co. B conducted at the park a couple of years ago. Anyone wishing to get involved as we move forward is certainly welcome to coordinate military and civilian education and presentations to the public. I am happy to present any thoughts and suggestions any of you wish to share with me so I can pass them along to the Muster's committee. Feel free to contact me if you wish to discuss any details not covered in this update.

The 2nd company was solid, clearly demonstrated; it was the crispest on the field in its company volleys and the GAR became the "foot cavalry" of the Union army, double-quicking all over the field to plug holes and put out fires. Rob Van never misses a fight and we appreciated his knowledge and aggressiveness even though we were afraid he was literally going to back himself into the rebel line a couple of times as he moved us forward.

This was truly a post 150 event with some wonderful things, some things that need to improve, but some clear assurance that the hobby, the GAR, GLB, and 7th remain strong, active, and forward facing. I am truly proud of all of the men of the 7th Michigan and our friends. I will accept the role of the "old man" willingly as we move into the next chapter of reenacting.

Oh--On Sunday, Sgt. Daniel Malick caught a certain private not following his own training on loading. Sergeant, you were completely correct in your correction. That said, who knows the fortune of war? I suspect that chastened private may be in command at the next event.



Sunday it rained again before tactical, after we drilled, and after the battle. Speaking of the tactical. The boys were only one of 2 companies to take the field and they literally were all over it. Fighting uphill, around obstacles, and through the brush, until we were stalemated by our old friend Ben Cwayna and the 12th SC. Ben requested my surrender and I informed him I was not authorized to do so but was authorized to tell him we were done for the day. The pm battle required us to be slaughtered by a smaller force of Rebs. Just as in last month's Wheatfield at Gettysburg we did our part and ended the battle with 2 survivors.

All in all a positive weekend. We agreed breakfast pizzas are "awesome" and we continue to move through a very positive season. On to Jackson!
