


150th Wilderness Event – May 2-4, 2014

Military School of Instruction/ Civilian Sewing Bee -Sat. Feb. 15, 2014 - Leslie, MI

The 7th Michigan Volunteer Infantry, Co. B will be hosting its sixth annual winter infantry drill session from 9:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. at the White Pine Academy. The school will open at 8:00 for early arrivals with coffee and pastries (free) available before drill commences. Brother units or individuals (both Union and Confederate) from throughout the state or out-of-state are invited to attend.

Lessons will cover the basics of soldiering and maneuvers taken from Casey's Infantry Tactics School of the Soldier, School of the Company, and School of the Battalion along with instructions from the 1861 U.S. Infantry Regulations.

- Marching and Facing Basics
- Manual of Arms/Stacking Arms
- Bugle Calls
- Firing positions
- Loading positions
- Skirmish Drill
- Salutations
- Common Company-level maneuvers
- Common Battalion-level maneuvers
- Basic Officer/NCO positions throughout the maneuvers
- Dress Parade/Color Guard (time permitting)

Mark Heath will be teaching the Bugle Call class as well as incorporating bugle signals into our movements throughout the day. Jim MacKinnon will be guiding us through the Skirmish Drill session. The Sergeants will be assigned and expected to instruct specific Manual of Arms positions.

All ranks are invited to participate from privates up through officers. Attendees should wear the uniform with their current rank, bring their rifle or sword, accoutrements, and soft-soled
shoes. You also are welcome to drop down in rank if you so choose to do so. Modern athletic shoes are strongly
recommended and encouraged as we are drilling inside a gymnasium on a tile floor. Please no heel plates. Leave all ammunition at home.

Civilian Social/Sewing Bee

Concurrent with the Military drill, the 7th Michigan civillans will be onsite working on sewing (modern and period) projects throughout the day. Any and all Civilians from other units are invited to spend the day working on projects or just socializing. Modern Clothing is appropriate to wear.

Potluck Dinner

The 7th Michigan Civilians have graciously volunteered to prepare a potluck dinner (free) for those wishing to eat at the school at lunchtime. Pamplin Historical Park

And The National Museum of the Civil War Soldier

HEY PARDS, this sounds like a possibly great destination for a **club roadtrip**. Perhaps the perfect excuse, in fact, for a long weekend getaway to warmer climes during those tedious northern winter months. When I was searching the internet this week, looking for images of winter quarters to use in this issue, I came across the website for Pamplin Park, a **National Historic Landmark** for Civil War enthusiasts of all kinds. (They DO have winter hours, from Dec. thru March).

Located in Dinwiddie County, near Petersburg, Virginia, visitors will have an opportunity to get a southern perspective on the war, as well as an overall look at southern life during the mid 19th century. The park is located on the site of the April 2, 1865 "Breakthrough," the battle that ended the Petersburg Campaign and led to the evacuation of Richmond, the Confederate captial. Also including, among its 424 acres, some of the best preserved fortifications on any Civil War battlefield, the park maintains thee miles of interpreted trails around the earthworks.

There are actually four museums, the Museum of the Civil War Soldier forming the centerpiece of the park and containing an impressive artifacts collection. Visitors experience the life of Civil War soldiers via interactive computers, videos, life-sized dioramas, and the multi-sensory battlefield simulation, "Trial By Fire." Other museums interpret plantation life, and slavery in America. There are also living history demonstrations played out in the Field Quarter, the Military Encampment, and other sites. The military camp reflects life of the Confederate soldier in typical camps from Virginia to Texas, and is located on ground once utilized as a winter camp by Brigadier General Samuel McGowan's (South Carolina) Brigade from October 1864 through March 1865.

Four lovely restored or reconstructed antebellum homes reside on the property as well. Some are open to the public. All of the homes and their original owners experienced the war first hand, as various episodes of the Petersburg Campaign ebbed and flowed across the land they occupied.

All in all, Pamplin Historical Park appears to be a four-star destination, worthy of a long drive and a visit.
