
Our first event will be March 25. This will be with our friends in the Great Lakes Battalion and will be our spring tune up for Shiloh.

# January Meeting Highlights



# **Book Review**

At the most recent club meeting Ellyn said she'd like to start a book review feature in the Newsletter. I volunteered to kick it off with a review of the first four books of a five book series by Ralph Peters. These books are historical novels in the vein of the ones done by Michael and later Jeff Sharra. They are very well researched and extremely realistic and readable. Some of you may have read this author's works under his former pen name, Owen Parry. He produced a series of very entertaining Civil War Murder Mysteries featuring a little Welshman by the name of Able Jones. These books were popular in the club for a time. The present series, like the Able Jones books, carries characters over from book to book to create a larger narrative. So, while the books will stand alone, I'd recommend reading them in order. The books I've read thus far are...

Cain At Gettysburg...Unlike other Gettysburg centered books, this one concentrates on the first day action north of the town and then on Pickett's Charge. The slightly different focus gives a different view of the battle.

Hell or Richmond...Covers the Wilderness through Cold Harbor

Valley of the Shadow...Is strictly about the Shenandoah Valley Campaign of 1864 and particularly on Sheridan and Early. Since my great-great-grandfather was wounded and captured in the battle of Third Winchester I particularly enjoyed this book.

The Damned of Petersburg...starts with the Battle of the Crater and ends with Hatcher's Run. This book is darker and even a bit depressing (as was *The Last Full Measure* by Shaara) owing to the large waste of lives during the siege and the terrible price to be paid for the all but given outcome of a Northern victory in the war. It also deals with the rampant racism on both sides and the atrocities visited on the black troops by both Confederate and Union soldiers.

One more book is forthcoming, not yet named, but would logically deal with Five Forks thru Appomattox. I found all these books to be enjoyable, accurate and very readable. I look forward to the final book. I have passed copies of books 2,3 and 4 to Ellyn and as she reads them they will be passed around the club.

Hope you get a chance to read them.

# - Cumberland Guard Annual Meeting -

### January 14, 2017, Fort Wayne, Indiana

Tom Emerick represented the 7th Michigan, Co. B at the recent annual Cumberland Guard meeting. The meeting was hosted by Guard commander, and good friend of the 7th Michigan, Colonel Rob Van. Many of the attendees were our comrades-in-arms from Indiana (30th, 49th), and Michigan (3rd, 4th, 1st USSS Co. B, Great Lakes Battalion). Introductions were made, past and future unit events discussed, etc. Most of the meeting concentrated on discussion of a new umbrella organization, Grand Armies of the Republic (GAR), and the 2017 Shiloh national-level event.


Bob Minton, Army of the Ohio and First Federal Division Commander, and Colonel Van elaborated on the purpose and organization of the modern day GAR. In brief, it was initially formed by unit representatives at the Perryville 2016 reenactment. It is intended to improve cooperation amongst the various western units as well as to increase fellowship and participation at the larger events. Discussion covered the destructive conflicts previously existing between the larger regional re-enacting organizations to the detriment of the hobby as a whole. We also reviewed the reduction in re-enactor numbers and events following the 150th event cycle. Hopefully a new era of cooperation will carry us forward into the future.

Bob and Rob next reviewed some of the 2017 Shiloh event details (i.e., command organization, schedule, location, authenticity, etc.) that is being co-hosted by our good friend Earl Zeckman of the Atlanta Campaign, Inc. General Minton is overall commander of the Union Army. Rob Van is commander of the 1st Brigade currently composed of units from the Army of the Wabash, Cumberland Guard, Great Lakes Battalion, and Military Division of the Mississippi. The event is looking to be a great re-enactor event with the well-scripted battles and troops led by experienced and capable commanders. We will be fighting and bivouacking on the actual Shiloh battlefield.




