

### CIVIL WAR COLLECTIONS ONLINE

The University of Michigan's Bentley Historical Library has announced the availability of a new resource called Civil War Collections Online. It features digitized content from 157 collections documenting the involvement of Michigan and Michiganders in the war.

The collections range in size from a single letter or diary fragment up to multiple folders of letters as well as volumes of diaries, notebooks, or reminiscences. The materials vary greatly in terms of literacy, legibility, and content. Diary entries might be brief comments about the weather or descriptions of camp life and battles. In addition to detailing military life, the letter collections address the experiences of people on the home front.

### THE BLUE BOTTLE RESPITE TENT — BY JULIE SARGE

New for the 2016 season is The Blue Bottle Respite Tent.

Its two-fold purpose? To present an impression that demonstrates how the Civil War and Spiritualism directly and indirectly affected one another and to provide a brief respite from the stress and trauma of re-enacting the war for those civilians and soldiers in need of such respite.

7th Michigan newcomer, Julie Sarge, portrays Zuleika Dean Attie, a single. hardworking woman who earned her living as a Modern Spiritualist Medium before her church, River's Edge Spiritualist Church in Kent County, Michigan, sent her to assist in the war relief work. This persona is based on several actual people from the era.

(Modern Spiritualism, based on the belief that the dead can, and do, communicate with the living, began in the United States in the I840's and gained in popularity in the '50's and '60's. As the war death toll rose, the funerary and mourning traditions were shaken apart, and many people, including President Lincoln, turned to modern spiritualist mediums for assistance in contacting those beyond the veil as they sought to come to terms with deaths of family and friends.)

The general public and re-enactors learn how the war and Spiritualism affected one another by attending presentations out under the awning/fly. Inside the 12' by 14' wall tent, re-enactors (soldiers and civilians, Union and Confederate) find help in dealing with the adversities of war/re-enacting war: thirst, hunger, exhaustion, boredom, dread, grief, soul loss, ghost pains, and concern for those beyond the veil.

Those interested in a "sitting" (the term used in that era for consultations with a Modern Spiritualist Medium) can sign up for a twenty minute session for a nominal fee, which, along with donations, supports the respite tent. Sittings are provided by Julie Sarge AKA Zuleika Dean Attie, a well-trained and experienced medium.

The following is Miss Attie's letter to her church:

Letters home from The Blue Bottle Respite Tent Dear Nollie.

Elspeth and I arrived at the Union encampment late yesterday, safe and sound but so travel-stained and bespattered with mud that the soldiers on guard duty mistook us for "laundresses" or worse---at our ages, too! They ordered us away as fast as our "muck-covered ar—s could go." Elspeth was shocked speechless, but I was (as Cousin Sukey would say) plain angrified. I said firmly, "I shan't move my 'muck-covered ar-e' one inch until you tell your commander that Miss Zuleika Dean Attie, MSM, from River's Edge Spiritualist Church in Kent County, Michigan, has arrived as planned to set up a respite tent to serve soldiers and civilians affected by the adversities of this war."

Sergeant Micah Darling (and, yes, Nollie, that truly is his name!) overheard this exchange and immediately interceded on our behalf. He escorted us to an area that "ain't fouled overmuch with ordure." Word of our arrival soon spread, and a dozen or so soldiers helped us unload crates and pitch tents. They asked us so many questions so quickly that Elspeth and I were hard put to answer them, but we did our best:

Yes, we're here to serve soldiers and civilians affected by the adversities of war, mainly thirst, hunger, exhaustion, boredom, dread, grief, soul loss, ghost pains, and concern for those beyond the veil.

Yes, we usually have fresh water, coffee, forager soup, and gingerbread free to those in need.

Yes, we brought checkers, chess, backgammon, dominoes, and solitaire to help alleviate boredom between battles.

Yes, there's a quiet place to rest, write letters, and draw.

Yes, we provide sittings for those who seek them.

Yes, we accept donations and those donations along with fees for sittings help fund the respite tent.

Private Sullivan Coburn promptly named the big tent "The Blue Bottle" in memory of Irish healer Biddy Early, who used that item---empty, of course!---in her healing work years ago. So, my dear Nollie, you may direct further letters to Miss Zuleika Dean Attie, MSM, The Blue Bottle Respite Tent, in care of the Army of the Potomac, USA.

PS Please send shovel, saw, hammer, and appropriate size nails to construct a privy. They are few and far between, and we must build our own.
