Alichigan, Aly Alichigan

Home of my heart, I sing of thee!

Mich-i-gan, my Mich i-gan.

Winifred Lee Brent Lyster of Detroit (Birth: Mar. 15, 1842 Death: May 7, 1930) wrote the original 1862 lyrics of "Michigan, My Michigan" to the tune of "Oh, Tannenbaum," (also the melody for "Maryland, My Maryland.") Her husband, Henry, a physician, became Medical Inspector and Acting Medical Director of III Corps in the Union Army.



He served throughout the entire war. Mrs. Lyster was inspired to write the song after the Battle of Fredericksburg.

Editor's Note: A wikipedia source also says the original by Mrs. Lyster was written in 1867, but I can't find corroboration for that. It seems most sources say 1862, following the Battle of Fredericksburg, as stated above. In the past 100 years or so, the song has undergone several revisions, with word changes reflecting the changing times, but it is the original Civil War version by Mrs. Lyster, which most evokes the spirit of the time in which the song was born.

I had some extra space to fill in this issue so decided to hightlight this beloved song that speaks of the beauties of our state, and the sacrifices made in the Civil War by our Michigan men. My favorite vocal rendition of the song is by actor and fellow Michiganian (or is it Michigander?) Jeff Daniels.

"Michigan, My Michigan," erroneously believed by many to be Michigan's state song (the real state song "My Michigan" is less known than Michigan, My Michigan), holds special meaning for members of the 7th MI, since our regiment is featured in one particular verse in the original 1862 version (with about 10 verses total!), and those words are now inscribed on the bronze plaque members of the club dedicated in Fredericksburg, VA, in 2007 and which stands on the banks of the Rappahannock at the spot where the famous pontoon crossing took place.

Military Report

Greenfield Village After Action

Security was tight! It seemed there was someone in uniform every 20 yards all weekend but despite their concerns the weekend went off without a hitch.

On Saturday, our ten plus 116th PA's five were second company and despite the captain's rusty drill mistakes earlier in the day the boys performed flawlessly in the field. The weather which threatened to turn ugly remained gorgeous all day and the lads entered the fray with a full stomach with the return of the company breakfast mess.

Sunday we combined for drill with the 17th/21st and turned command over to a fresh faced Lt. Giorlando who put the men through the paces, but were our own company for the tactical. Initial volleys were, shall we say, "less than stellar," but the boys rallied and all ended well.

Monday had a reduction in numbers and the 7th, 102nd, 116th Pa, US Marine Guard, and Sharpshooters were combined into 3rd company. Yours truly was

too slow to dissent and command of the drill company fell on my shoulders. I can say with pride the boys did a fine job and it also gave me the honor of commanding the company for the Memorial Service. As always, this was and is a moving thing for me and most of the men, but had even greater meaning for me as I had watched my Marine DI cousin's memorial earlier in the weekend (died in Feb of a heart attack). I am grateful to Chris Sodman for carrying Serge's photo out to the green with him and for the company to allow me to share the photo and his story with them before we dismissed.

"Al" Tingley took command of the demonstration and the boys were "surprised" to be put on the skirmish line. With no rehearsal and in some cases no experience they performed admirably well.

I would like to cite two men for special notice. First, David Graham; on his first event ever David fit right in, learned quickly, and his good humor and stories were appreciated by all. Secondly, Brevet 1st Sqt. Andrew McComas, who despite responding initially with a polite "no thank you" when informed Thursday evening he would be in the role, performed amazingly well and at times even saved the Captain from greater embarrassment on the field with his whispered suggestion.


The highlight for me was the Eagle Tavern dinner with several of the men and the 3 NCO's who celebrated birthdays that weekend.


7th Michigan Members:
