




It was good to see Dave Downing at the shoot. He said: "It feels great to be able to be seen." Dave thanked everyone for their support during the difficult time of his recent illness.




Charlie Colegrove Memorial Shoot

Civilian Report

Hello All!

The reenacting season is finally upon us with events starting this month. I would like to thank all of those who came to the live shoot and helped to set up and clean up!

Our first event this month will be Civil War Days at Ella Sharp Park in Jackson, MI. This event is Friday and Saturday May 20th and 21st. Friday will be a program for school children and Saturday will be a living history. On Friday our civilians will be at the farmhouse and we will be talking about civilians' roles in the Michigan Aid Society and we will also be rolling bandages with the children while they are at our station. For our part in this we will be talking about care packages that were sent to the troops. If you have any extra shirts or socks that we can use to fill our packages please let me know or bring them with you on Friday. There will be a flag raising at 8am on Friday and the first group of kids will be starting at 9. You will need to be there by 8:30 at the latest. We can set up any time on Thursday and there is modern camping available. As of now there are almost 400 kids signed up for Friday.

For Saturday we will have a couple of different activities. Some of our ladies will be stretching a quilt, some will be doing fashion talks, and some will be in the farmhouse to greet visitors and answer questions. To help share the work load for both days I have a schedule of work shifts for those who will be attending to sign up for. On Saturday night there will be a candlelight tour and we have been asked to participate by demonstrating parlor games. We will need as many civilians (men and women) to help participate in the games. This looks like it will be a very nice event and they are already planning on doing it again next year. If you can make it to either day please come and help support Ella Sharp Park. Please let me know what day you will be attending and what shift you might like to work.

On Monday the 16^{th} this month we will be meeting at Bob Evans in Jackson for dinner at 6pm and then going to Ella Sharp to plan out our activities. If you would like to help us finalize our plans please feel free to join us.

The Answers

At our civilian meeting on April 23, at the Live Shoot, several questions were asked by the ladies regarding the Ella Sharp Event. Below are the answers received from Traie Shelhart.

Ellyn Painter, Sue Colegrove, co-coordinators

- 1. Will the Museum cover the cost of reenactor lunch and supper on Friday, prepared by Lorrie Roland? Yes. The arrangements for this are being worked out between Traie and Lorrie. Everyone needs to provide their own dishes and silverware. Cook fires will be allowed in the authentic camps for those who wish to prepare their own food. NO fires of any kind are permissible in the modern camp, as it is not on Museum grounds.
- 2. How much bunting or other patriotic decorations do we need to supply? Vonda Warren's roll of red-white-blue striped bunting fabric would be much appreciated. Traie has some bunting and enough swags and other things. Also, if anyone has any spare candle lanterns they can bring, Traie can use those as well.
- 3. Are pets allowed in modern trailers? Yes. Pets are welcome in modern camp.
- 4. Can we civilians have permission to walk through the Ella Sharp village area following our Monday, May 16 dinner meeting at Bob Evans? Yes. In fact, Traie offered to meet us at the Park (he will be there by 7pm, although I told him it might be closer to 7:30 before we can finish dinner and arrive there), be available to answer any last minute questions, AND open up the farmhouse for us to tour the inside

The other two questions had to do with some confusion over exactly what we would be doing at our Friday station with the school children, and on Saturday evening during the candlelight tour. Katie Everett has answered both these questions in her report at left.

A parade march of soldiers through "town" will occur at 2pm on Saturday. Civilians are needed to line the streets and cheer them on.

Other things we'll do in the farmhouse on Saturday — Assist visitors in trying on period clothing; help make the 300 or so cockades that will be given out at the flag ceremony in July; Sandy McCarrick will possibly be reading letters from soldiers as we sew; we are also responsible for "policing" the house—ie, keeping visitors from going upstairs or sitting on furniture,
