FROZEN TEARS: Part 3: The Hidden Healers By Julie Sarge

Question: Who overheard whom say that about whom?

Strangely enough, there was one small group of soldiers who had access to effective treatment of PTSS during the Civil War era. They'd had such treatment available for hundreds of years, and all but a handful would lose access to such treatment as the Civil War ended and the Indian Wars flared into their final battles.

If a soldier was Native, and he belonged to a Nation that

- 1. Believed that warriors in battle acted in ways that were unacceptable by usual norms
- 2. Believed that in battle one might and probably would sustain physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual wounds
- 3. Believed that all such wounds must be treated for warriors to heal and return as functional members of society
- 4. Addressed PTSS as soul loss
- 5. Performed a soul retrieval for those with soul loss

then that soldier, if he survived to return home, had a very good to excellent chance of healing PTSS.

Soul retrievals varied slightly from healer to healer, but all involved

the healer seeking and finding the lost soul parts or "essence" of the wounded one, the part that "dissociated" during the original trauma. The wounded person was encouraged to redefine perspectives about the trauma until the healer and patient agreed that all was ready for the return of the lost soul parts. Once this was done, the patient might still have some adjustment work to do, such as grieving, or asking forgiveness, but he was much more able to do so, for he had access to a "restored self."



"Road to Andersonville" film Details Civil War Service of Michigan Native Americans

Literally on the eve of my plans to send out the current issue of the 7th Michigan's newsletter (on the night of Nov. 1, to be exact), I chanced to attend, in the small auditorium of my local public library, the showing of a documentary film called "Road to Andersonville," hosted by a historian named Chris Czopek, who wrote the book *Who Was Who in Company K* (cover shown at right), and is featured in the film. The nearly two hour film is about a forgotten, and largely unknown group of Civil War soldiers from Michigan – the men of Company K,





1st Michigan Sharpshooters. All 140 men in the company were Native Americans, representing several Michigan tribes, among them Ojibwe (Chippewa), Potawatomie, Odawa, Ottawa and others. I perused a copy of the "Who's Who" book at the film showing, but decided not to purchase, as it is listed at \$80 a copy. But as the book represents 20 years of research and painstakingly accessed detailed information on every man who served in Co. K, the volume is probably well worth the price.

Czopek, a former Civil War reenactor, and current member of a Sons of Union Veterans camp from the Lansing, MI area, first became interested in the soldiers of Co. K when he ran across a grave in a cemetery at Pine Creek Indian Reservation near the village of Athens, MI (in the southwest corner of Calhoun Co.) of a veteran of Co. K. He wanted to know more, but didn't know any Indians. Then he saw a news article about a man named Don Otto, living on a farm near Albion, MI, who is a descendant of Co. K soldier Marcus Otto, (shown on the cover). Otto introduced Czopek to a Native American veterans group called the Anishinabe Ogitchedaw. He also contacted historian Ray Herek, whose book *These Men Have Seen Hard Service*, about the 1st Michigan Sharpshooters is foundational to Czopek's own later work, and the rest, as they say, is history. During the course of the Civil War, Company K and the 1st Michigan Sharpshooters saw action at several major engagements including the Wilderness Campaign, Spotsylvania, Cold Harbor, and others. A number of fascinating exploits were related during the movie. At the Siege of Petersburg, fifteen men of Company K were captured and sent to Andersonville Prison (hence the name of the movie). Half died and are buried there. In 2010, seven members of the Anishinabe Ogitchedaw, all descendants of the those interred at Andersonville, traveled there to honor these dead with a special ceremony, which is shown in the movie.

A number of fascinating exploits of Co. K were also related in the movie, as well as personal information about some of

the men, related by Czopek and Herek, and various Indian descendants of Co. K. The question of why any Native Americans would have been eager to enlist in the Federal cause during the War Between the States was also discussed. At the time of the Civil War, Indians were not U.S. citizens, and during the early decades of the 1800's Michigan Native Americans, along with all other eastern tribes, had been subject to the cruel removals that forced them from their lands to exile on reservations in the West. By the 1840's, though, many were returning to Michigan and purchasing land in their native homelands. It is surmised by those in the film that Michigan Indians feared being treated as slaves by the Confederacy, or at the very least, having their lands again taken from them, if the South won the war. Interestingly, one of the soldiers in Co. K was an infant at the time of the "Trail of Tears," whose mother was forced to abandon him when the soldiers driving the Indians from their homes refused to allow her to go back for him. Fortunately, some of the villagers escaped, returned, and found the child. Twenty years later, he chose to enlist in Co. K. At the beginning of the war, Native American men who sought to join the Federal army were denied enlistment, but later in the conflict, they were gratefully accepted, as the government began to realize the value these men might be to the fighting strength of the Union war effort.

"Road to Andersonville" is an immensely rewarding viewing experience, on a topic of rare consideration in Civil War scholarship. I didn't think to ask where it might be showing next, or how one may arrange a showing, but these websites have information on the movie, as well as Czopek's book. Mr. Herek's book is available on Amazon.com




