

"TEAR DOWN THAT WALL!"

JACKSON GEARS UP FOR MORE CASCADES RENOVATIONS

The unsightly concrete wall that has fronted (and affronted!) the Jackson Cascades Falls for decades is coming down. In an article in the Jackson Citizen Patriot on Thursday, September 25th, Jackson County officials said the Falls "will likely be uncovered before spring 2015." The demolition might even be done as early as December of this year.

Local construction companies are donating some of their help to remove the 150-ft. wall and amphitheater behind it, thus reopening view of the Falls from Brown St. and beyond, as it was from the early days of the park. Removing the wall is the first step toward a \$9 million renovation and redesign project. The county's ultimate goal is to return the site to its original state, open and fully accessible to the public far and wide.


The Cascades at Sparks Foundation Park (the true name of the park usually known locally as Cascades Park) originally opened to the public on May 9, 1932, and in its heyday attracted large crowds from all over the country, and even from other countries. By 1969, when the wall was constructed, the Falls was already showing its age. The wall and chain link fence surrounding the entire Falls were constructed to keep out vandals and generate revenue (by charging admission) for maintaining the Cascades for future generations.

Several renovations have been required, besides the one in 1969, and now, once again, the entire Cascades is "falling apart at the seams," its electrical, mechanical, and water filtration systems being just a few of the issues needing attention besides the aesthetics of the site. It is probable that a wall of some sort will still be present on the front of the Cascades, but it will be see-through, and include a plaza where the raised seating was. More long-term renovations could include demolishing and rebuilding the fountain, creating a spray park and two new buildings.

It is not known at the present to what degree these changes could affect the future of the Jackson Civil War Muster, but it is the speculation of this author that if the opening of the Falls to more free access by the general public attracts a new influx of visitors, it might possibly help our event by increasing our numbers, as well. As always, however, we reenactors will embrace the future, whatever it may be, as we have the past.
