

PRESIDENTS REPORT





Cascades Civil War Muster (Jackson) After Action Reports

August 24-26, 2012 – 28th Annual Cascades Civil War Muster - Jackson, Michigan

First, fatherly pride. As many of the 7th Michigan oldtimers know the youngest of our five kids, Kyle, reenacted with the Club from age two until he enlisted in the Air Force six years ago. For the past month my wife, Joan, has been "strenuously" insisting she would be falling into the Company ranks at Jackson. I was sworn to secrecy (sorry Dave Slayton) about her participation. I was ordered not to loan out any of my camp equipment, rifle, accoutrements, or clothing to any of the guys so she could use them. I was totally confused about the reasoning although "Jo" Emerick has passed muster as a flag bearer during parades. Happy wife means happy life and I know who commands in our household. We shopped for "our" rations, reviewed the military schedule, tried on my uniforms and accoutrements for fit, and planned what equipment to bring. I even guietly endured her constant complaints of not (never) having end caps on my shelter half. Friday morning I dutifully set up her tent with all of the necessary equipment. Friday evening, while sitting around Headquarters talking with Joan, staff, and friends, a Confederate private approached my tent. It was one of those "I recognize the face but just can't quite place the name" moments in time. I then realized it was my son, Kyle, standing before me. Two weeks previously Kyle notified Joan and I that he was deploying to Korea for a year and I had been struggling with how to visit with him in Texas before he left the country. In the meantime Joan, other 7th Michigan members, and Kyle conspired to fly him from San Antonio Friday morning to surprise me. As he hugged me he said he could not miss this opportunity to serve under his Dad's command at Jackson. You raise your children, love them, and send them off to make their own way in the world hoping everything turns out for the best. And then they surprise you with something special and you realize all of your

It is just so cool to have Mark direct and move the company around from a hundred vards away at the behest of the Battalion commander. Of course, it will be better once I learn (and remember) what the bugle calls mean. I'm still relying on hand signals some of the time, along with a variety of arm waving.

Once again, Heather and Brittany Jarrett, along with Laurie and Anson Roland provided food that was excellent and so much appreciated. It makes the soldiers days easier, and provides the sustenance we need. If there are others the helped, forgive me for not knowing your names, but our thanks are extended to you as well.

Special recognition goes to Doug McComas who assisted in running the event while still participating in all the action as our First Sergeant. Don Everett likewise assisted in making the event go and being Quartermaster to keep our troops supplied with equipment. Finally, Jeff Verstraete was in charge of the whole thing, and did his usual superb job. It is hard, difficult, long and frustrating work at times, we know, and we appreciate what these gentlemen did so that we can enjoy participating and sleeping in the shade. Thank you all.

As for the event, it didn't rain again and the humidity was not too bad. The heat was a problem for re-enactors and visitors, but the medical staff was on top of it and treated those that needed help or transport to the hospital for a tune-up. One of our Sergeants, Craig Searles, noticed one of ours was going down the road to heat exhaustion and stepped in to prevent a bigger problem and got the



worries were for naught. I spent the rest of the weekend observing my son's interactions with active and non-active duty service members within the Battalion and amongst spectators. I now realize Kyle has grown up to become a good man, a truly dedicated defender of his country, and I am extremely proud to say I am his father.

I had a great time at Jackson. Let me rephrase that. I had "the best time ever" at Jackson since I started re-enacting there 23 years ago as a 7th Michigan member. I was honored to serve as overall Union Commander and work with re-enactors I have served with, under, or admired from afar for decades. The biggest kick was working with my peers in the other branches of service (cavalry, artillery, infantry, and medical) along with the Confederate command structure all of whom I consider experts in their respective fields. Working together to educate and put on a good show for the public in a safe manner whilst having fun is what makes this hobby worth all of the effort. I wish to personally thank the other branch commanders (Jim Newkirk/John Clark - Artillery, Craig DeCrane - US Infantry, Kevin Yeager - Cavalry, Moira Foster - Medical, Nick Medich - CS Overall Commander) for all of their input and contributions in making this event special.

Union Headquarters. Was a small staff this year composed of Dennis Whiting (Lt. Colonel), Bill Ziemba (Adjutant), Todd Willis-Redfern (Sgt. I relied heavily on Mark's expertise. He not only used the bugle for the normal camp signals, but communicated maneuvering signals to everyone (cavalry, infantry, sharpshooters, etc.) He is a tribute to his profession. a close friend, and really.

fun to work with. To Paul Davis (Major), my other wing commander, we missed you and I do hope you recover quickly from your illness.

Overall Commanders.

Craig DeCrane and alternated as wing and Battalion commanders throughout the weekend I finally had an opportunity to see the battlefield from the view Craig has enjoyed the past several years. Craig did a great job (as always) patiently (sometimes excitedly) mentored me

young man back to normal very quickly. It's one of those things the 7th does well, that being to look out for each other.

The 7th had at least 27 members and potential members participating in the battles. Great showing! We also picked up four from the 30th Indiana and 3 or 4 from the 21st Michigan on various days. Thus we were able to field probably the biggest company. On Saturday, I had the privilege of commanding the Company, and on Sunday the Captain of the 21st Michigan likewise led the Company (until he was wounded and left the remnants to me as the Lieutenant at the time). At the end of Sunday's battle, I think there were only about eight of us left. The men in the ranks enjoyed the weekend very much, especially when Colonel Emerick was our Wing Commander one day, and overall commander the other next.

The battles were well thought out, integrating the artillery and cavalry more in the infantry portion of the battles. Being safely near the artillery can be eye opening when you feel the thump in the ground, feel the air concussion and experience the over-whelming sound. It gives us a miniscule feel for what the soldiers in the Civil War went through, and any war veteran for that matter. Thank you military veterans or active duty personnel in the 7th, for your service to our country. God bless you all, along with your parents and families.

throughout my baptism of fire. Craig appears to make things look so easy and under control and I am (will be) happy to serve him in any capacity. Working with Nick Medich, Bill, Mack, and the rest of Nick's staff was a pleasure (really an education). Nick's suggestions vastly improved the proposed scenarios and his execution, given my overly complicated scenario timings, was better than anything I could have hoped for. I suspect Nick held back his normal aggressive attacks since it was my first large command and I thank him for that.

The Infantry. I could not have been prouder to serve as Colonel and/or wing commander of this battalion of infantry. This year we brigaded multiple smaller units in order to field larger than normal companies. The individual companies "elected" company commander(s) and NCOs for the weekend. There was not a whimper or complaint from the ranks or Officer

Corps regarding these arrangements. In fact, all of the men seem to appreciate maneuvers involving the larger companies. The men did everything asked of them and more in spite of the heat during drill sessions and the battles. The following Midwestern units should be proud of their performance over the weekend:

The Cavalry. Our normal contingent of six riders exploded to double that number for the weekend. We had originally planned for the cavalry to go gray all weekend given Nick was more experienced in how to employ them effectively. Captain Yeager suggested using the increased numbers to better effect and they fought on both sides (sometimes switching sides during intermission or "halftime") throughout the weekend. It was great to see the Michigan Cavalry Brigade engaged during the battles whichever side they fought on.

The Artillery. This year Jim and John proposed a new method to identify the artillery safety fire zones in order to avoid injuries and/or shutting down gun crews prematurely due to safety concerns. It worked perfectly. The long arm was actively cannonading throughout the scenarios without a single incident. One of the most impressive scenes I remember from the weekend is the two battalion charge (Breckinridge's) being blown away at the end of Sunday's scenario. Jim, thank you for the advice and coaching before the weekend began. Kudos toall of the artillery units.

1st Michigan Light Artillery, Battery D 1st Michigan Light Artillery, 3rd Battery 21st Indiana Light Artillery, Battery B 7th Indiana Light Artillery Robinson's Battery **The Medical.** You never notice them but they are always there when you need them the most. Moira Foster, the 8th Michigan Medical, Battery D Medical, and all of the other volunteers were a godsend throughout the weekend. The 90 degree temperatures both days were hard on everyone but the load was lighter due the water, ice, and liquids dispensed by these "Angels of the Battlefield".

The Battles. My wife and spectators, both days, could not believe how much activity was happening on the battlefield. The US and CS service branches worked together this year to open up the battlefield for increased maneuvering and to reduce safety issues and the results were especially impressive. Many compliments were heard regarding the constant artillery fire and cavalry fighting throughout all of the battle scenarios. Even I had a few OMG moments while observing some intense cavalry clashes and, of all things, the Sharpshooters forming squares to repel cavalry charges. was the first time anyone could remember all three branches (artillery, cavalry, and infantry) heavily engaged simultaneously on the battlefield at Jackson. The crowd missed seeing it but we arranged for a rock throwing incident on Saturday. Julie and Katie Everett created 163 unbelievably accurate fake rocks for the Confederates to throw at the Union troops during the attack on Jackson in the railroad cut. Unfortunately, the wind kept blowing them back towards the Secesh troops.

Odd goings on. Dueling church services were the norm on Sunday morning in Union camp. We did not have a confirmed minister for Sunday morning Military Church Service so Friday I "recruited" Reverend Stan with Battery D to officiate a service next to my tent. Unbeknownst to me the 8th Michigan Medical minister was officiating a Lutheran service just across from my tent. While returning from errands in the Confederate camp I was treated to singing and ministering from both sides of the street. We "rewarded" Nick Medich with both Confederate and Union armies singing happy birthday to him in the middle of the battlefield on Sunday immediately after the battle. Thank you to Bill and Mack for organizing the sing-a-long. Nick, the presents are in the mail. The 7th Michigan, in cahoots with the Union infantry, "rewarded" me with a gift of a raptor in a cage after the Sunday after battle procession. Inside joke and too long a story for this newsletter.

Finally. There are many people who deserve credit for making Jackson the great event it is year after year. The public and reenactors alike truly appreciate your efforts and sacrifice.

In closing, I hope to see you all next year at Jackson!



After Action Report: Historic Ft Wayne Civil War Days, July 7-8, 2012 by Keith G. Harrison

It was an honor to be asked (albeit at the last minute) and I thoroughly enjoyed serving again as the overall Union Commander at Civil War Days at Historic Fort Wayne. Other 7th Michigan members present (that I saw) included Dean and Victoria Mielke, Bruce, Marcia, and Bernadette Butgereit, Carl Moss, Marilyn Hughes, and Dan Conklin. The Union troops, in particular, Captains Russ Paul, Bruce Robere, and J.R. Schroeder, did a tremendous job with their companies. It was a little warm (100 degrees) on Saturday, which cut down the public's attendance, but cooler on Sunday (80 degrees), which resulted in a much greater attendance in both public and troops.

The schedule for Saturday included flag raising, drill, ice cream social, battle, memorial for the departed reenactors (and the Emerald Peacock). The Sunday schedule was basically the same but with Church inserted.

The battle portrayed both days this year was the July 1862 Battle of Malvern Hill, Virginia. Consequently, for those who know history, it was a turkey shoot for the Union. In fact, Confederate General D.H. Hill, after the war, indicated that the battle "... wasn't war, it was murder." Next year, I am certain that the Confederates will get their way in at least one of the battles. Historic Fort Wayne embraces so much of Michigan's military history, and until just recently, when the Historic Fort Wayne Coalition got involved, had been a largely forgotten historical jewel in this state. A lot of work has been done by the Coalition and its volunteers, but a tremendous amount still remains. I would strongly encourage everyone to support the Fort as much as possible.
