

Jackson Muster 2013 After Action Report By Dave Slayton

For the military wing of the 7th Michigan Voluntary Infantry, it was another good year at Jackson. The weather was fine and spending time with family and friends is always a privilege. Over the course of the weekend we had 23 individuals in the company at different times with eighteen from the 7th Michigan and five from the 44th Indiana who fell in with us. It was a good group that performed very well, and got the maneuvers executed as good as any. Thank you to everyone in the ranks; you always make the Captain look good even though I kept mixing up right and left. Thanks also to the overall Union commander and organizer of the battles, Colonel Tom Emerick for the great scenarios, organization and overall command on the field.

On Saturday we recreated the battle at Chancellorsville for the first part of the scenario, and got appropriately routed. For part two of Saturday, the scenario was We had artillery and Salem Church. cavalry support in both, and that always makes the experience better. In fact the cavalry group that attended came from Florida (wow), Ohio and I think one from Michigan. What a commitment and we appreciate the effort it took. On Sunday we did the Wheatfield, which was back and forth with heavy casualties on both sides, with the Confederates eventually taking the field. In this battle, I don't think the 7th had any left standing.

Opening salvo. The weather gods blessed us this year. No rain, warm (less than 90 degrees) days and nights where everyone added an extra blanket to ward off the chill. The host units again honored me with the opportunity to serve as overall Union Commander. Union Headquarters ran with a small staff (the smaller the better) this year composed of Dennis Whiting (Lt. Colonel), Jim MacKinnon (Major), Bill Ziemba (Adjutant), Todd Willis-Redfern (Sgt. Major), J.R. Schroeder (Aide-de-Camp), and Mark Heath (Chief Bugler). Bill and Todd managed everything in camp behind the scenes all weekend long to take the load off of my shoulders. Everyone worked together to make the camp run smoothly for the troops. Mark Heath did yeoman work again with camp signals and was top-notch in maneuvering troops during the battles. Thank you my friend.

Branch Commanders. I wish to thank the other branch commanders (Jim Newkirk/John Clark – Artillery, John Russell – Cavalry, Moira Foster – Medical, John McIntosh – CS Overall Commander). I had originally scripted out four separate battle scenarios (two each day). All of those plans were modified due to shifting the artillery safety zones to accommodate the increase of artillery pieces from last year. When the branch commanders walked the battlefield each morning to discuss possible scenarios, everyone provided input which resulted in a better show for the public and more historically accurate maneuvers for the men than I had originally imagined. Good friends working together are what make this hobby worth all of the effort.

The Infantry. I know I bragged on the increase in artillery for 2013 but the Union infantry also grew in size for the second straight year. We came awfully close to fielding a 200 man battalion. This year we attempted to brigade multiple smaller units in order to field larger than normal companies. Of course our good friends, the 3rd Michigan, Co. F, always bring their large company to Jackson which challenges Headquarters to equalize the size of the remaining companies. The consolidated companies "elected" company commander(s) and NCOs for the weekend. I did have to back pedal a little as the size of the combined companies increased several fold from walk-ons Saturday and Sunday mornings. We were "forced" to designate smaller companies composed of Sharpshooters and those red-legged devils (114th PA Zouaves) in order to accommodate

Then came Pickett's Charge, with a cannon prelude. The Rebels made the charge, and did a fine job as they ran headlong into a well defended position and got flanked. There was a planned hand to hand combat, and the charge was finally repelled. All in all the scenarios went very well I thought, and the 7th Michigan men performed valiantly. Thank goodness for the resurrection. Which brings up a funny occurrence, as during one battle we had a lot of casualties in our line, most playing the departed. We had the remaining troops kneel down, which they did. We needed to fire and I ordered "RISE UP", and most of the men on the ground dutifully started to get up. That's unreasonable for the dead to do, so we got them all to quickly lie back down, amidst a lot of smiles and laughter because of the Captain's commands. They were listening however and unfortunately did exactly what I said. With the zombies safely back on the ground, we kept going with the rest of the battle.

Thanks again to Anson Roland for providing breakfast both mornings. Always a treat and appreciated. And then came the free reenactors dinner, which I always think is a blessing since we don't have to prepare our own food, or something that vaguely resembles food. Thank you to all that took care of our men, your work is greatly appreciated.

One last memorable event was mail call. The company was informed that a package had arrived at the post office in Jacksonburg, so we walked down to see what it could be. A former member of the 7th that now lives in Texas, Ann Bond Detavernier, sent a letter to the company written up as if it was 1863. The great thing was the package that came with the letter, as it contained fruit preserves and some pickled cucumbers and peppers and such. What a thoughtful thing to do, with a lot of work, time and expense to get that to us. Thank you for the gift Ann, and the surprise mail and package that troops always are grateful for.

The Cavalry. This year a half dozen troopers from the 3rd USCC traveled from the deep South (Florida and Georgia) in order to participate at Jackson for the first time. They served under the steady command of Sergeant John Russell.

The Artillery. This year Jim Newkirk and John Clark altered the battlefield set-up (actually improved upon it from Saturday to Sunday) to incorporate a few more artillery pieces than last year. If you would have asked me how to safely squeeze in another field piece over and above last year at Jackson, I would say it could not be done. But, Jim and John could and did. The long arm was actively cannonading throughout both days and we had our second straight year without a single safety issue. Artillery units participating were:

Battery B, 21st Indiana, Lt. Art. Battery D, 1st Michigan, Lt. Art. Robinson's Battery 3rd Battery, 1st Michigan, Lt. Art.

The Medical. They are always there when you need them the most. Moira Foster organized and commanded the 8th Michigan Medical, Battery D Medical, and all of the other volunteers throughout the weekend. The military load was lighter due to the water, ice, liquids and modern medical care dispensed by these "Angels of the Battlefield."

The Battles. As mentioned before I had scripted out the battles for both days but had to abandon these plans due to extenuating circumstances (the over abundance of artillery). My obvious shortcoming (to the spectators and reenactors alike) this year was packing too much military action in too limited a time slot. Everyone still appreciated the split battles each day with the "half-time" resurrection. We just came up short in the duration of the battle scenarios.

The two Saturday battles were hard fought but for only 15 and 20 minutes respectively. I learned my lesson and worked with Col. McIntosh and Major Newkirk to stretch things out a bit more on Sunday. Saturday we recreated the 11th Corps rout at Chancellorsville and The Battle of Salem Church. For the 11th Corps rout we pre-staged individual Union companies along the road bisecting the battlefield only to have them overwhelmed in echelon by the Rebels. For Salem Church we marched the entire Union Army into a three-sided box of Rebel troops and engaged in a fighting retreat from the battlefield. Col. McIntosh and the Rebel Army were more than willing to inflict massive casualties on us to recreate the losses actually sustained by the Union troops. In fact, we left almost three quarters of the US army on the field either wounded or dying. The comments we overheard from the Secesh is they had never seen so many dead bluebellies on this battlefield before.

Sunday's battles were my favorites but, then again, the Union Army was the final victor. We had originally planned to recreate the Wheatfield and the Peach Orchard battles. Col. McIntosh offered to replace the Peach Orchard with Pickett's Charge for the second scenario. The Confederates were ecstatic about the carpet of Union dead we left behind during the Saturday battles and wished to repay us in kind. I wholeheartedly accepted the offer to recreate the battle in which the 7th Michigan was in the thick of the fighting on Cemetery Ridge 150 years ago.

The 4th Texas (CS) and the 4th Michigan (US) have built up a reputation for recreating hand-to-hand fighting at events. We took advantage of that acquired "talent" by having them climax the Wheatfield scenario with hand-to-hand fighting, the capture of the 4th Michigan flag, and the death of Col. Jeffords (as played by Dennis Whiting). The crowd loved it and no military were injured during the melee.

For the Pickett's Charge scenario, we employed Major Newkirk's suggestion and recreated the cannonading preceding the actual attack. As long as we had an over abundance of cannon we were going to put them to good use. We charged the Color Company with carrying the 7th Michigan regimental colors to honor the men who stemmed the Rebel tide at the wall 150 years ago. Then, someone had an epiphany and suggested climaxing Pickett's Charge with hand-to-hand fighting at the Angle. The 4th Michigan and 4th Texas "volunteered" (you really cannot hold these guys back) to recreate the hand-to-hand melee again. The remainder of the Union troops recreated (ok, we came close) the flanking maneuvers and fire of the 8th Ohio and the Vermont Brigade at the very end of Pickett's Charge. After the final battle and before anyone resurrected, Mark Heath carefully walked to the center of the battlefield to blow Taps. I could not understand why it was taking Mark so long to get there until I stepped out past the Angle portion of the fighting. To my utter surprise there was a carpet of Confederate dead stretching the entire length of the battlefield from where the charge originated. When Mark played Taps you could feel the sanctity of the moment realized by both re-enactors and spectators. This was a stark reminder of why most of my comrades recreate history for the public.

Every year there are many, many people who deserve credit for making Jackson the great event it is. I know it is not proper but I have to single out Jeff Verstraete (7th Michigan Chairperson) for his dedication and sacrifice before, during, and after the event. Jeff, without your efforts Jackson would not be the fantastic event it has grown to be.


