Personal news items are welcomed and encouraged, or photos of special events. Original articles (800-1000 word limit) pertaining to the Civil War or reenacting are also desired.





Jackson, concluded...



### Frozen Tears: Exploring Civil War Era PTSS in the Context of Civil War Re-enacting

Part 1: Overview

(Question: Which long-running TV western portrayed Civil War veterans prone to PTSS as "Weary Willies"? Answer appears at end of article.)

Soon after the American Civil War began, army surgeons, doctors, nurses, and civilian volunteers noticed a strange new malady among the wounded, sick soldiers who came into their care, a malady seemingly unrelated to their physical wounds and in a separate category altogether from the usual diseases such as pox, smallpox, measles, mumps, typhoid, and dysentery. This unknown illness had an odd, worrisome set of symptoms that included bouts of rapid heart palpitations; shortness of breath; sleeplessness; nightmares; visual, auditory, and kinesthetic hallucinations; sudden intense rages; sudden intense panics; an inability to weep; crying jags; constant unnecessary vigilance; hopelessness; a need to control everything and everyone; and more. Not every soldier displayed every symptom, and some soldiers displayed weirdly opposite symptoms, such as an inability to cry over the death of a friend or relative but breaking down into uncontrollable sobs upon spilling a spoonful of porridge on the floor.

That most medical personnel and volunteers chose to note these symptoms as illness was fortunate for the affected soldiers, because civilians who displayed such symptoms were often declared insane and sent off to asylums that were little better---and often worse---than prisons. Of course, given that there was a war to fight, it was impossible to declare dozens, then hundreds, of soldiers in both armies to be mad as hatters and lock them away. As time went on, however, with no clear cause nor cure for this strange condition, it was not only possible but also quite common to condemn the afflicted soldiers as cowards, shirkers, malingerers, and traitors to the glorious cause---be it Northern or Southern.

Those in the medical fields and mainstream society in general had been trained to treat physical body wounds and physical disease only; that a soldier might have sustained a mental, emotional, or spiritual wound was unthinkable. Physical wounds were more difficult to deny, given a soldier minus a hand, dripping blood, or appearing to have three extra joints in his shin due to broken bones. Chills that caused teeth to rattle like castanets, fevers that dried out compresses in minutes, vomiting, and diarrhea were also difficult to ignore.

Standard treatments of surgery, diet, mercury pills, medicinal alcohol, quinine, and laudanum had little to no effect on this malady called "irritable heart," "nostalgia," or simply "homesickness." New treatments included prohibiting any activities that reminded soldiers of home in hopes that such prohibitions would cure "homesickness." Other treatments such as vigorous physical work served as a temporary distraction but not as a cure. Again, what applied to one case did not apply to other cases, and at the end of the war, all that was known was the collection of symptoms.

Home didn't cure "homesickness" for those soldiers who survived the war long enough to return there. The fathers, brothers, uncles, cousins, and sons had not only changed physically during the war but mentally, emotionally, and spiritually as well. So much so that in many cases, although the home folks were grateful that their returning soldier was spared a painful, lonely, traumatic death in the war itself, they had no way to cope with the painful, lonely, and traumatic aftermath of war that the ex-soldier struggled with day and night.

One hundred fifty years after the War Between the States, this mysterious malady would be termed PTSS, Post-Traumatic Stress Syndrome. It would become a familiar, but not always understood, term. In the years that recently followed the war, former soldiers who displayed symptoms of PTSS were often treated as civilians were---they were declared insane. Sadly, many spent their last years in asylums little better---and often worse—than prisons.
